Real Property Assessments for Homeowners: Fact Sheet

Understanding real property assessments is essential for homeowners as it directly impacts property taxes and the valuation of your property. This fact sheet provides a comprehensive overview of what real property assessments entail, how they are conducted, and their implications for homeowners.

What is a Real Property Assessment?

A real property assessment is an evaluation of the value of a property conducted by a local government assessor or assessing Board. This valuation is used to determine the amount of property tax owed by the homeowner. Assessments are typically performed periodically, often annually or biennially, depending on local regulations.

Implications for Homeowners

It is not uncommon to hear property owners complain that their village is updating their assessments just so it can collect more taxes. Actually, a cursory understanding of the municipal budget process would dispel this misconception. When a reassessment results in increased assessments due to rising property values, tax rates should go down proportionally. This is because the tax levy is not being distributed over a broader tax base. If tax rates go up or stay the same, it simply means that municipal budgets are going up. Taxes are a zero sum game, what one property owners doesn't pay will be picked up by someone else. So, if one property or one neighborhood is significantly underassessed, not only are they paying to little in taxes, but other property owners are subsidizing that taxpayer's or neighborhood's share of the bill.

How Assessments are Conducted

The assessment process involves several steps:

1. **Property Inspection:** Assessors may visit the property to evaluate its condition, size, and features.
2. **Market Analysis:** Recent sales of comparable properties in the area are analyzed to estimate value.
3. **Data Collection:** Information such as property size, age, improvements, and location is collected.
4. **Valuation:** Using various methods, including the sales comparison approach, assessors determine the property's assessed value.
